

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRPERSON

Emeritus Professor Brian Robertson

For this special anniversary, my report will briefly recall the past 20 years, rather than review the past year only. In 1994, 5 years after my appointment as Head of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Cape Town, which included Valkenberg Hospital, I asked my wife if she could help to improve the patient facilities at Valkenberg. Francoise held her first meeting with three parents of patients in August 1994, and they decided that the most pressing need was to replace the old, Victorian admission wards with a new state-of-the-art High Care Unit. Architects were recruited, and in 1995 an advertising company, Bosman Johnson (FCB) took us on as a charity project. The Friends of Valkenberg was registered as an NPO, and awareness and fundraising campaigns began. Many of you will remember the Bosman Johnson slogans that were flighted on radio, newspaper, cinema and cars, such as: "Valkenberg Hospital: Yes, it's close to home", and "Go Mad, Give Generously".

By 1996 support for the campaign had grown and funds were accumulating so the decision was taken to establish a Trust. On the 26th November 1997 The Friends of Valkenberg Trust was constituted with Emeritus Professor Stuart Saunders as the first Chairperson. Around the same time rumours began circulating that the hospital was to be closed to save money for the province. The Friends initiated a massive publicity campaign to oppose the closure and the Department of Health agreed to keep Valkenberg open. However in June 1998 the imminent closure of the hospital was announced. The Friends organised a public protest march through Cape Town to the Department of Health, and at the 11th hour the MEC for Health, Piet Marais, agreed to keep a downsized Valkenberg Hospital open.

As it was clearly not possible to expect funders to support a hospital that might close, the Trust decided temporarily to shift their focus to developing services for patients and to support staff. A cafeteria was opened, a garden service provided, a hair dressing salon started, a clothing depot established, a coffee trolley provided in Outpatients, and various crafts were taught to patients, mostly by an ever increasing number of volunteers. Later, wards were refurbished, and equipment bought for the hospital. In 1999, fundraising for the new admission ward recommenced. By 2001 funds had been secured and architectural plans presented. At this point Stuart Saunders handed over the baton to Dr Hannah-Reeve Sanders. It was also the year that Sandra Matthew took up the position of Programme Manager.

Public Works took over the building project, and in the end, the Department of Health agreed to provide most of the funds. Building commenced on the new High Care Unit in 2002. After various setbacks, the new Ward opened in 2006. In the meantime the Friends continued to develop services to patients and staff and attract increasing numbers of volunteers to staff these projects. The riverside wards were refurbished and the Friendly Shop, selling second-hand goods, was opened.

It was not long after this that National Treasury announced that Valkenberg Hospital was due to be completely rebuilt as part of the Hospital Revitalisation Programme, and indeed the HRP is currently under way. From proposed closure to rebuilding as a modern psychiatric hospital, Valkenberg has come full circle to take its rightful place as a renowned teaching hospital offering first class psychiatric care. The Friends of Valkenberg Trust is now on a sound financial footing, thanks to the efforts of the trustees, the office staff and of course, our donors. A close and cordial working relationship with the hospital and the Hospital Facility Board means that the patients and staff benefit maximally from the resources that we generate for them. Among the many resources are 63 caring volunteers who give generously of their time and skills.

Our Vision is the recovery of all patients from serious mental illness and their return to optimal wellness in the community. With your support, we hope to achieve this.


The first thing that struck me on my initial visit to Valkenberg Hospital was that I saw patients walking around in pyjamas and the grass was up to their knees and my heart just sank to my shoes and I thought "what do we do here" – I just despaired. The other thing was that Valkenberg was a very closed hospital and no outsiders could just walk in. When we mentioned to the then Medical Superintendent, Dr Bowey what we wanted to do, we got his full support and the support of all the Valkenberg Hospital staff – they were fantastic.

We then opened a little office, Ann Parr and I, and sat and wondered what to do. We started by collecting clothing. One of the chronic patients was brought to us – a lady who was 72 years old and had been in the hospital for 50 years. A Staff member brought her in to get some shoes as she was wearing 2 separate shoes, one high heeled and one flat. Fortunately we were able to give her two pairs of shoes that fitted – it was the first time that woman had received a gift of any kind while she'd been there. It was the middle of the year and she hugged me and wished me a merry Christmas.

This made us realise that the patients were very, very institutionalised and had been for years and that they weren't used to anything "personal". So Friends started to treat them as people. We decided to start looking at what we could give them and collected items that the staff could give to patients as they needed it.

Cape Town was so supportive when we made appeals for Valkenberg Hospital, people were always very generous. Bosman Johnson, especially, they did such a lot for us in terms of publicity and Cape Town continues to support us in so many ways.

Looking back now over the 20 years, we can see what a difference has been made to the patients of Valkenberg hospital, they walk in clothes not pyjamas and have their needs met by the Hospital and Friends. They have a place to come and request what they need and we've made them feel like people, not just a file number.




MESSAGE FROM PATRON




HAIR SALON

HAVE WE MADE AN IMPACT?

Fran our founder recently commented that in their first week the Friends staff issued 2 pairs of shoes. In the last financial year we distributed 907 pairs of shoes! This is a fine example of the growth in impact that Friends has achieved over the past 20 years. And of course it's not just about shoes. This past year volunteers ran on average 23 weekly groups, supporting the recovery of patients in a wide variety of ways.



The National Mental Health Policy Framework 2013 says that recovery from mental illness is about hope; about the restoration of a meaningful life, despite serious mental illness. Instead of focusing primarily on symptom relief, as the medical model tends to do, recovery looks at the restoration of self-esteem and identity. And this is what the Friends is all about.

Much of the impact we make is hard to measure on a scale. We can count the number of tops and sweaters given to people via the Clothing Depot (1306 in the past year) but it's hard to measure the self-esteem attached to those items. We can tally the number of hours that volunteers gave to service users (over 1870 in the past year) but struggle to measure the hope those volunteers bring. We can total the number of participants in our weekly Cooking groups (about 450 in the last year) but it's hard to measure the growth in essential life skills. It's hard to establish how much the confidence gained by mastering a task in a sewing group translates into confidence in the home on discharge. And it's hard to measure how giving someone a bit of time and treating them like a person, helps them just to get through another day.

In the past year we have again been able to extend our range of services and number of volunteers, meaning that we are extending our reach to more and more people and supporting their recovery process in more diverse ways. We have also piloted some exciting new projects like the Hair Salon training programme where patients are trained in barber skills that they can take back to their communities on discharge.

It is a huge credit to the Friends staff that Friends continues to grow and innovate and make an impact, despite tight controls on budgets and limited staff hours.

VOLUNTEER PROJECTS EXPENDITURE








